They spent many hours during the weeks after their exams preparing their entrance into the graduation hall. In Zambia, this is a very elaborate event and a special moment in the life of the graduates and their family members attending. The pupils also prepared a poem which they performed with great confidence and everyone shared something they had learned while at Kapumpe, these included: reading English, respecting adults, speaking English, being kind, solving maths, how to be a Christian, sharing and many more. It was wonderful to hear how their learning went far beyond the curriculum and their time here has impacted all aspects of their life. Our hope and prayer is that they continue learning and teaching others every day of their lives.

Pre-school

Term 3 has been very orderly in Pre-school. You will often see the pupils lined up outside the room, in rows sitting on the mat, walking in a line to assembly, even their shoes have been lined up against the wall outside. When Mr Chola has not been in the room, school captains have found it easy to give the pre-schoolers instructions as they have become very good at obeying school rule #1: 'We listen and follow instructions.'

They have become animal experts this term, not only knowing the names of animals but also where they live and how they move. Their final topic was all about being on the road where they learned about road safety as well as what and who uses roads.

When asked to write about food we get from animals it was lovely to see them enthusiastically write 'soseje' – sausage. A favourite food for many of them. They have really enjoyed the topic all about their life recently and discovering more about their own families as well as themselves.

This class continued to build on the success of last term and Miss Sichimwi has once again seen great progress and maturity from her pupils. Where there was once a concern about sending some pupils to the next grade, she now feels confident that they will all be able to manage. Some of the Grade 4 pupils joined the class this year with almost no English and now they are confident to both read and write basic English. This class have really come to love books this term, even guessing what will happen next, they are very excited for harder books next year.
